#### WORDS FROM OUR PASTOR -----

#### **DEAR FRIENDS:**

#### **HELLO:**

Several weeks ago I was walking to my car, when I noticed a stranger getting out of his car. He had just shut his car door when I arrived at my car, which he had parked beside. As I opened my car door, I said to this man, "Hello, I hope you're having a good day?" As our conversation ended he said, "by the way, thank you for taking the time to say hello."

I wondered how many opportunities I miss, daily, to bless others, by not saying hello? I wonder how many opportunities I have missed to pray with someone, encourage someone, or lead someone to Christ because I was in too big of a hurry to simply say, hello?

In Acts chapter three Peter, sees a lame man sitting beside the temple gate. Scripture says that Peter fixed his eyes upon this lame beggar (v. 4). Peter could have chosen to pretend he did not see or hear this lame beggar, but Peter did not. Peter could have been so preoccupied with getting to the temple that he missed seeing the lane beggar, but again he did not. Scripture states that Peter fixed his eyes upon the man. In other words, Peter became present and involved in the man's life. Peter took the time to hear the individual, and meet his need for healing.

God might not use us in the dramatic way He used Peter, but, He cannot use us at all if we do not first become present in the lives of others. The more present we become in the lives of others, the more able He is to use us in their lives.

Obviously we cannot be present in the lives of every person. Jesus had just completed His earthly ministry, and in the years He had ministered, He had never had the opportunity to heal this lame beggar. Jesus, while present in the lives of many, had never been present with this individual. Jesus' earthly work was complete, but Peter's ministry was in progress. Peter was continuing in the work Jesus began—the same work you and I continue

The best place to begin is at home. Be intentional with your spouse, children, and family members. I once had a child tell me that they felt safe with me because I took time and listened to that child. The child explained that mom and dad were so involved with their tablets and mobile devices that he knew they never really heard him speak. I am confident that the more intentional we become with our inner circle, the more this intentionality will spillover into our lives with those outside that inner circle.

As Babbie Mason has written and sang, "Each one can reach one; as we follow after Christ we all can lead one. We can lead one to the Savior; then together we can tell the world that Jesus is The Way" (1990, Word Music). Perhaps reaching that *one* is as simple as a sincere, *hello*.

First off, let me do a little horn honking. Ms. Catherine G. Winslow has been faithfully for at least my lifetime, producing, editing, and printing our bulletin and Lamplighter which I look forward to reading weekly and monthly. She is the person behind the scenes who makes it happen without accolades or enough mention in my opinion. So, thank you Ms. Catherine!

I bumped into Ms. Catherine at the copier at the Meeting House where we were both on a mission from God to copy text for two different services. She met me with understanding and patience and encouraged our efforts to facilitate the day's worship; and this invitation to share.

Two weeks ago Mark Baker and I went to the Oyster Bar to plan our 6<sup>th</sup> annual Chili Cook Off. We ate. We chatted. We laughed. We did everything but plan the cook off, but on the way home we were reminiscing about past nursing home visits and the fruit from it, and right in the middle of Turnpike Road almost audibly the Holy Spirit said, "Mrs. Vivian Winslow, Gates House. # **Neighborly love**

As an ordained minister, Fred Rogers harnessed the power of television to tell children they were loved — and to show them how to love others. In You Are Special, he writes, "When we love a person, we accept him or her exactly as is: the lovely with the unlovely, the strong along with the fearful, the true mixed in with the façade, and of course, the only way we can do it is by accepting ourselves that way."

In a review of the touching documentary Won't You Be My Neighbor? a writer for Variety notes: "Rogers' real secret was ... that the call to love your neighbor as yourself isn't a slogan to hang in your kitchen with flowers around it — it's a decision you make at every moment, to view every man, woman and child on earth as your neighbor. If you don't see and feel that, and act on it, then you're just another narcissist with a kitchen slogan."

Last October, when a synagogue shooting shattered the peace of Rogers' real-life former neighborhood, residents of all religions embraced one another as neighbors. Afterward, the Fred Rogers Center stated, "We long for a day when there is no more tragedy born from hatred."


