## WORDS FROM OUR PASTOR -----

DEAR FRIENDS,

### OVERWHELMED WITH JOY:

*I am overwhelmed with joy in the LORD my God! For he has dressed me with the clothing of salvation and draped me in a robe of righteousness. I am like a bridegroom in his wedding suit or a bride with her jewels.* Isaiah 61:10, (NLT).

One of the greatest feelings of joy is one's wedding day. Isaiah, whose book has often been called the *fifth gospel* due to its emphasis on the person and work of the Messiah gives us a look at the feelings of joy God gives.

Isaiah begins, *I am overwhelmed with Joy.* The wedding day is a beautiful expression of this overwhelming feeling. To be *overwhelmed* means to *bury beneath a huge mass of something.* In this case a huge mass of joy. Most people would agree, their wedding day ushered in the feeling of being overwhelmed by joy, excitement, and the beauty of something new.

Isaiah reminds us, *For he has dressed me with the clothing of salvation and draped me in a robe of righteousness*—this is a joyous thought. First, God has clothed me with salvation. Such a freeing feeling when we realize God's grace covers us. Christians are no longer chained to guilt over the past. We are not perfect, but we are perfectly forgiven. All our shame, all our disgrace, all our sin has been covered by God's grace, forgiveness, and salvation. There is such joy in knowing that God has given us the garment of salvation, a garment we could not make, or put on without His aid.

He has also draped us in a robe of righteousness. *Righteousness* is a big word that means we are *in right relationship* with the Almighty. Again, we could not make this happen. There is nothing we can do to accomplish righteousness by ourselves. The only thing we can do is respond to what God has done for us. It is humbling to acknowledge that we are sinners and can do nothing to stop sin. God, full of grace and mercy, has wiped away our shortcomings.

Take a moment to think back on your biggest regrets. Now take a moment to recognize how God has exchanged your guilt, your baggage, your sin-stained clothing for brand new wedding clothes. When two people are united in holy wedlock, they are no longer bound by the old, *singleness*; they are now in a new, joy-filled fellowship with the one they love. God has made possible for us, through Christ Jesus, a way to be in a new, joy-filled fellowship with Him.

Sin separated us from fellowship with God, like singleness once separated us from our betrothed. God gave Christ so all who believe in Christ can know right relationship with Him, just like the institution of marriage made a way for us to be joined to the one we love. It is such a joy to be united with our earthly love; it is even a greater joy to be united with the sovereign creator of the universe.

Like a groom in his tux and a bride in her jewels, there is great joy in finally being united with the one you have chosen for life. There is joy in the preparation, and there is joy in the life together. While earthly marriage only brings temporal joy, the union with God brings eternal joy. An inner-joy that goes with the believer through this life, and throughout eternity with the Father. The experience of this joy is overwhelming because it is a joy that has no ending.

### LOOKING BACK:

*In previous Newsletters, memories from our 150th Anniversary, which was held last year, have been shared. In this newsletter, another member, Linda Hall's memories are being shared.*

When we arrived at Meeting, we stayed outside to talk because once entering the sanctuary, you were quiet. A school hand bell was rung by the Superintendent when it was time for Sunday School to start. I think we started at 9:50, not 10:00 o'clock.

There was a devotion given by the Superintendent and then announcements were made. Every third Sunday, roll call of the children was made for them to come forward and give money for missions. Everyone looked forward to that because you never knew what the little ones would do.

Before the educational wing was built, the little children met in the room that is now the secretary's office and the pastor's office with babies and toddlers staying with their mothers. (page 3)

The "Blue" Room was also used as well as the back two rooms in the sanctuary. I remember that when I was around 10 or so, my group met in the basement.

After the educational wing was built, my group (teenagers) met in a room that later became part of the eating area. Mr. Herbert was our teacher and although he taught the Bible lesson, he also taught us everyday living using his farmhand (Luke?) as an example. Poor Luke could sure get into some trouble and Mr. Herbert would point out how not to do what Luke did. We all enjoyed Mr. Herbert's teaching.

My very first memory of going to Meeting was sitting beside Grandmama under her right arm. I was around 5. There was no Children's Church so all the children sat with their parents. The pews did not have cushions like now and were very hard. If I started to squirm or get too restless, Grandmama would pat my leg and if I continued to squirm, a pinch (a hard pinch) on the leg would let me know that I might be in trouble later if I didn't stop squirming.

Cousin Lizzie (Elizabeth White) was the pastor and Grandpapa sat in the pulpit with her. He would usually stand and have something to say about a Bible verse or whatever the Lord led him to say. I don't remember it, but Judy says that she remembers he always knelt by his chair during prayer. Did you notice that I said Cousin Lizzie? All the older people in Meeting were called "Cousin": Cousin Lizzie, Cousin Sylvia, Cousin Sobelia, Cousin Roy, Cousin Mary Dempsey, Cousin Ola, Cousin Ernest, etc. The parents of my age group were usually called by Mr. or Mrs.: Mr. Herbert, Miss Jessie Mae, Mr. Lyndon, Mr. Wink, Miss Vivian, Mr. Rollo, Miss Rennie, etc.

I don't remember the piano being played but I vividly remember Miss Ruby playing the organ and then later Miss Johnnie. The men had a Chorus and went to a lot of churches to sing. There must have been twenty or so men in the Chorus.

There was no air conditioning. In the summer the windows were opened and there were two HUGE fans in front of the pulpit aimed toward the congregation. Anyone talking had to talk above the noise of the fans. I don't remember if they oscillated but I don't think they did. I don't remember about the heat until I was older and the boiler was in the basement. You knew when it was working because it made clanking noises.

We had a very active Youth Fellowship. It seemed like there were more than 20 or 25 in the group. Bethany's youth joined us on Sunday nights since there were so few of them. (We also joined Bethany's youth activities). We would have Bible quizzes and singing and a lesson. It was a great time together.

Once our group went to Leslie Winslow's Meeting near Greensboro to meet with their youth. We had an old school bus that we rode. I don't think it went more than 45 mph! I will never forget a stop we made at a restaurant on the way. Waldo ate 3 meals in one sitting. It impressed me so much that I have never forgotten it. During that visit they took us ice skating where I don't think any of us got on our feet for more than a minute or so. What fun!

Leslie's youth group came to Up River a year later and stayed in people's homes like we had done when we went to Greensboro. Because we did not have room at the Meetinghouse for such a large group we met at the Community Building for our activities.

On Sunday nights, Pastor Rahenkamp could drive around the neighborhood picking up children go to Youth Fellowship. One Sunday night he had picked up Grandpapa and I, and others. We had gone past the cemetery and turned onto Up River Road and had almost gotten to Mr. Archie's first driveway when he remembered he had not stopped for H.S. Davenport who lived about where Scott lives now. So he threw the car in reverse and proceeded to back into the left ditch. I remember Grandpapa and I were on the front seat. Grandpapa rolled the passenger window down so we could crawl out of the car. I think Mr. Archie pulled the car out of the ditch. We kids walked to Youth Fellowship that night.

We had Bible School in the mornings from either 8 or 9 am until noon. We met in the classrooms and had our arts and crafts activities in the outdoor shelter. A lot of the kids rode their bikes and I was one of them. I kept a lot of the crafts we made. I had a basket made from popsicle sticks and a bank in the shape of a church. We were given a snack around 10 or 10:30. It usually consisted of cookies and Kool-Aid but one day we had Welch's grape juice. I will never forget how good it tasted and always looked forward to that day each year! Commencement was on Friday evening and all the classrooms were open so everyone could see what was studied and made in crafts. There was no cookout or games.

# Richardson earns prestigious Presidential Scholar distinction

A Perquimans County High School senior and one of his teachers were honored by the U.S. Presidential Scholars program.

Caleb Richardson was among 161 students selected this year out of about 4,000 nominees nationally. He attended an event in Washington D.C. this month. The Presidential Scholars program was established in 1964 by a Presidential executive order. It is administered by the Department of Education and is meant to honor the nation's most distinguished graduating high school seniors.

In 2015 the program was extended to recognized students who have excelled in Career and Technical Education (CTE) fields. It is in that field that Richardson was nominated and is being recognized. Only 20 students nationally are being honored for their CTE part of the Scholars award.

Also recognized was Angel White, the agriculture teacher at Perquimans County High School.

Richardson nominated her.

Richardson started raising and showing animals at age 9 with 4-H. Now at age 17, he owns 30 head of cattle and is part owner of Whistlin' Pines Farms. He maintains day-to-day operations of the cattle farm along with being an honor student at Perquimans High and helping his father, a commercial fisherman. Richardson admits during calving time when cows give birth, things can get a little hectic.

Richardson said he loves what he does and he credits White for helping him learn and grow.

"She helps me pursue my passion," he said.

Through the Future Farmers of America (FFA) program White oversees, Richardson said he's had the opportunity to learn much at Perquimans High School as well as attending meetings and conventions statewide and nationally.

"It's helped to have the opportunity to travel," he said.

By being named a Presidential Scholar, he and his family had the opportunity to travel to Washington D.C. for a program there in June. He said he's only been to the capitol once before when he was 12 years old. He got a chance to go a Major League Baseball game with the Nationals and attend a youth baseball

camp.

This time he had the opportunity to meet with government officials, educators and others. He was awarded the US Presidential Scholars medallion at a ceremony sponsored by the White House.

Melissa Fields, the principal at PCHS, said she's extremely proud of Richardson. She points out only four North Carolina students were named Presidential Scholars this year and Richardson is the only one from a traditional public school. One of the four attends the N.C. School of Science and Math, another attends a charter school focused on the arts, and the third attends a private school.

"I could go on and on about the amazing accomplishments of this young man," Fields said at an awards ceremony. "Joseph Caleb Richardson is an asset to our school and community, and I am confident that he will be highly successful in his future. He is a hard-working and dedicated individual who goes above and beyond in everything he does."

White agrees that Richardson is special.

"I am ecstatic that Caleb was recognized for his hard work and determination," White said. "It is a well deserved honor. At 17 years old, Caleb has positively impacted the lives of many people around him, myself included. He has taken advantage of the opportunities provided to him through our school and community organizations and utilized them to improve not only himself, but the lives of his peers and those in his community. He is a positive role model for other students in the classroom, in the FFA, and in 4-H. Earning this recognition also helps other students see that there really is no limit to what you can achieve if you are willing to put in the time and effort."

As for her honor, she said "it is nice to be honored as a distinguished teacher and have other teachers and community members recognize the dedication that goes into my programs on a daily basis. What makes the honor more special is that the recommendation came from a student."

Richardson also said he's also appreciated the support of Jared Harrell, a livestock specialist with the Perquimans County office of the N.C.

Cooperative Extension Service.

"He's always been a mentor to me," Richardson said of Harrell.

So it might not be much of a surprise that when Richardson begins his education at N.C. State University, his goal will be to train to be an extension agent. And in the meantime, he's learning even more by working for Tidewater Ag this summer.
