#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR:

#### **DEAR FRIENDS:**

#### IN MOSES' SANDALS:

Last month we discussed Moses and the five excuses he made to God when God called him to lead the children of Israel out of Egypt. This month, I want to put myself in Moses' sandals and look at the five excuses in perspective of excuses I have made to God. The first excuse Moses made sounded genuine. God, I am not qualified to do what You are asking. The next three excuses were me centered. God, what if they doubt me? God, what if they ask me? God, I do not speak well. Finally, Moses states: God, send someone else.

I can parallel this to my life. Many years back I received a call to serve as the director of a boarding school for at-risk and troubled teens. First, I was pastoring a church, and very comfortable and happy. Second, at that time, I had no formal training in education—I felt like an impostor, serving as the director of any school. Third, I had not experienced the life choices many of these teens—I was reared in a happy, Christ-honoring, law abiding home. Fourth, I would give up my privacy, living and working the majority of the year at the boarding school. Fifth, like Moses, I wanted God to send someone other than my wife and me.

Here is what God taught me at the boarding school. The lives of all humans matter. He used my wife and me to communicate Biblical truth to those teens. Some of the teens began a relationship with Christ while in our care and have not only grown spiritually but have maintained friendships with us over the years. God always put quality, qualified people around me to answer my questions and help me with reports I had to perform for the state. God was able to use me because I was willing to let Him use me. I was not qualified, I was willing, yet I was apprehensive, not wanting to step outside my comfort zone. Had we not stepped outside our comfort zone and answered God's call, there would have been several teens who would have served time in adult prison, at least one attempted suicide, and at least ten lives that might not now know Christ.

Perhaps Moses felt like an impostor? He was Hebrew by birth, yet he had lived a life of privilege. Moses never knew the whip on his back, the forced slave labor, or the atrocities of slave life; he only knew privilege. Perhaps his feelings of being an *impostor* were the reasons he wanted God to send someone else?

The more I put myself in Moses' sandals, the more I understand I make the same excuses. Sure, the situation I face are different than the ones Moses faced, but I believe the primary excuses are the same. I am not qualified; suppose I am asked questions I cannot answer; what if the people You send me to doubt me; I get tongue-tied; and please send someone else.

The lesson to take from Moses' life is this: move when God asks. Even though Moses made excuses, even though he may have felt unqualified, doubted his ability; and wanted God to send someone else, Moses moved when God asked. God did not use Moses because he was qualified, but God qualified Moses as he continued to submit himself to God. The same applies to us, the more we submit ourselves to God the more usable we become in His hands. Christians must remember God's strength is made perfect in our weakness (2 Corinthians 12:9).

The following article was shared by Shelby Shore, wife of Wiley Shore, in their Newsletter. They are members of Deep Creek Friends Meeting in Yadkinville, N. C.



Somerton Friends Meeting Religious Society of Friends Richard J. Wilcox, Pastor Historical Marker Dedication, June 11, 2016 Wiley and I were invited to a celebration recognizing Somerton Friends Meeting as the oldest in Virginia. They are a member of North Carolina Yearly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends. At this Independence Day, it seems appropriate to remember the beginning when we did not have religious freedom. We, and other friends present felt Richard Wilcox' message of this history should be shared so that we better appreciate what our forefathers did for us. (You can compare this to Deep Creek Meeting established in 1793.) Shelby Somerton is located a short distance across the North Carolina line and about an hour or less from Virginia Beach and near the Dismal Swamp that early settlers would have crossed.



I guess the primary reason we are here today is because we are part of an institution that is old. Not too many organizations survive to see their 344<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The historical marker recognizes that Somerton was one of the firsts, and is the only Quaker Meeting in Virginia from the 1600's that is still an active congregation. Written minutes from monthly meetings are preserved on microfilm and date from the 1680's and go continuously up to our business meeting last month. What the marker doesn't say is that Somerton is also the oldest active Friends congregation in North Carolina or Maryland, and we believe may be the oldest continuously-worshipping Christian congregation in the City of Suffolk. Somerton is over a century older than the United States of America, and was over 70 years old when the town of Suffolk was founded at Constant's Wharf. There are a few active congregations in America that can trace their founding to Colonial Days, and very few of those can say they were founded by their denomination's founder.

We were one of the firsts, one of the oldest, and we survived to today, so we get a sign on a four-lane highway to celebrate that we are old. However, that isn't what I really want to celebrate today. In of itself, it could just mean that we are a stubborn organization, an irrelevant archaic antique leftover from the Colonies that just refused to die. That isn't what I want to celebrate today.

In the 1600's, England was being tom apart by religious conflict; it was a new Protestant country with one faction supporting small reforms in the Church of England and the Monarchy, with another faction wishing to purify the English Church of anything seen as Catholic and wanting a more democratic form of government. Each side had armies, and the power struggle would eventually pull the nation into Civil War and take the head of the King. Not all English wanted to choose between the Anglicans and the Puritans. A group of seekers—spiritual followers of Jesus—many of them in their teens and twenties—saw the choice between The Church of England and the Puritans as a false choice. They saw that both sides controlled armies that ravaged the countryside, and saw this war and violence and striving for political power as completely against Jesus' teachings of love and forgiveness. They envisioned an opportunity to restore Christianity back to what it was supposed to be all along.

They taught that all of God's people were equal in God's eyes, and that it was wrong to recognize distinctions in class, in title, as well as gender and race. They refused to remove their hats or bow for Lords and Ladies, they refused to change their pronouns, as was the custom of the day, and instead referred to all human beings as "thee", and they did not want to hear sermons from university-trained scholars that the Anglicans and Puritans used, but instead wished to hear anyone who was anointed by the Holy Spirit, young or old, male or female. In fact, the first Quaker missionaries to reach the American colonies were two women, arriving in Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1656, only 16 years before Somerton was founded.

The Quakers refused to take oaths, since Jesus said not to swear. They refused to join the armies. They refused to participate in the rituals of the State Church, and were reluctant to pay tithes to support Anglican priests. The Government responded, in force. Parliament passed the Quaker Act, or the Act of Uniformity, in 1662 requiring all Christians to only use the Book of Common Prayer, and that worship had to follow the

established rituals approved by the State. Two years later, Parliament went further by passing the Conventicle Act which prohibited groups of more than 5 who were not of the same household from worshipping in a manner unauthorized by the Government. Please remember that, as a British colony, Virginia is governed by Parliament at this time, and the Quaker Act and Conventicle Act were enforced in Virginia. Quakers were jailed in Williamsburg and in Norfolk. Quakers were publicly whipped; Quaker women were stripped naked and hauled through town.

In 1672 when George Fox, one of the primary founders of Friends, made his way back from Carolina Colony to Virginia, and preached to a gathering of sympathizers and spiritual seekers in Sommertown, he was breaking the law. When Friends officially organized a meeting to regularly worship on Sundays, and conduct business as a Monthly Meeting, they did so illegally. They also did so where, as I might say, out in the boondocks. For the Sherriff and the Magistrates would seek out and arrest Quakers found in Williamsburg or Norfolk, but they were not as likely to walk out to Southern Nansemond County past the Dismal Swamp to worry about some illegal worshippers. Illegal or not, Quakerism thrived out in the swamps and woods of Nansemond.

Quakers purchased lands from Native American tribes, at market value, and aimed to live peaceably among Native Americans as neighbors. When a young Tuscarora male was accused of murder just across the border in Quaker-controlled Carolina, the Quaker Governor insisted that he be tried by a Native American jury, not an English one. Quakers counties had women magistrates and elected women to the general assembly, and once the Carolina government switched to the Anglicans from the Quakers it would be centuries before women would hold elected office again.

They may not have had roads or internet, but the Quakers of Nansemond were not isolated. Letters from Friends would travel from Yearly Meetings and Monthly Meetings on both sides of the Atlantic, and traveling ministers would visit and bring news and the Gospel. John Woolman, a traveling Quaker preacher from New Jersey traveled down the thirteen Colonies preaching that slavery was incompatible with Christianity. He noted the resistance that he got among other Christians in Virginia, how scripture was quoted to him to "prove" that God had ordained Africans to be enslaved, even heard the arguments about how Virginians were actually helping Africans by bringing them to America as slaves, and he preached to anyone who would listen about how the Gospel of Christ cannot allow one human to hold another in bondage against his or her will. Minutes show Friends from Somerton were present to hear Woolman preach. Remember that was before the Revolutionary War, and was 115 years before the Civil War.

The preaching of equality, of integrity, of peace, of simplicity, and of community led to life being different depending on what part of Nansemond County you were living. It has been noted that Suffolk Parish of the Church of England hired out slaves to support the education of white children, while lower Nansemond was known as a "Quaker Asylum" where many free Blacks and people listed as Mulattos owned land. A book called the "Negro in Nansemond County" notes that before the Civil War there were more Free Blacks that owned property in the Holy Neck District of Nansemond County than any other magisterial district in all of Virginia. In the 1670's the Quakers had found some sanctuary in the boondocks from the magistrates in Williamsburg and Norfolk, and now they were providing sanctuary for others.

After the Civil War ended, Somerton Friends built a school to educate the children of freed slaves, quite possibly one of the first in Virginia, but in 1866 under the cover of darkness, both the meetinghouse and the school were burned. The meetinghouse that Friends rebuilt is the one you are sitting in now.

For almost three and half centuries, Quakers have been striving to preach and to be witness to the Gospel of Jesus in what is now the City of Suffolk. That Gospel, which emphasized equality of gender and race, led them into conflicts with their neighbors, with other churches, and with the State. Yet they sought to



hold the faith and fight the good fight. Their message was relevant to the people of Suffolk in the 17<sup>th</sup> century, in the 18<sup>th</sup>, the 19<sup>th</sup>, the 20<sup>th</sup>, and I believe remains as relevant as ever to Americans in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. That is what we celebrate today: that the Risen Christ is among us in 2016, and has come to teach us how to live in peace with one another.

## **Answering God's call**

During a 2010 trip to report on famine-relief efforts in Kenya. Kristen Welch observed conditions unfit for living. "How can you allow so much suffering?" she asked God. In return, he asked her the same question.

That prompted Welch to put her faith into action by launching Mercy House, a nonprofit organization that rescues pregnant young women and their babies. The impact of Mercy House in Kenya — plus now in 19 other countries — is "miraculous proof that God is made perfect in our weakness," Welch says. "Who would have thought a 'yes' in 2010 would make us the poster children that [prove] God can do anything with anyone?"

## The 'art' of forgiveness

An interesting legend is associated with the painting "The Last Supper." Some say Leonardo da Vinci used a rival's face for Judas. Then when the painter tried to create Jesus' face, all he could see was that of his enemy. Supposedly, da Vinci was able to complete Jesus' face — and the entire masterpiece — only after making peace with his enemy and repainting Judas.

This tale shows the necessity of forgiving other people so we can accept Jesus' forgiveness for ourselves. As Jesus says in Matthew 6:14-15 (NIV), "For if you forgive other people when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive others their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins."


## Raise your praise


