#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR:

**DEAR FRIENDS:** 

#### PERFECTLY FORGIVEN:

I am reminded of a cartoon where a father turns to his son and asks, What did you learn today in Sunday School? The boy looks at his father and then replies, Hypocrite! Wow, that insight is both humorous and telling. Frankly, there may be places in our Christian walk that feel a bit hypocritical.

Recently I read an article entitled, Applying the Old Testament Law Today by J. Daniel Hays. Hays goes into detail around the thought Jesus expressed about His fulfilling the law, "(Jesus) did not come to sweep away the righteous demands of the Law, but that He came to fulfill its righteous demands. As the climax of this aspect of salvation history, Jesus fulfilled all the righteous demands and all the prophetic foreshadowing of the Law and of the Prophets." (2001). Daniel Hays' summary is a beautiful explanation of Jesus' statement, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them" (Matthew 5:17, NIV). Jesus fulfills the righteous demands of the Law. I am unable to fulfill all the righteous demands the law stresses. Paul even wrote, "Once I was alive apart from the law; but when the commandment came, sin sprang to life and I died" (Romans 7:9, NIV). Jesus, never meant He was going to abolish the law, God still expects me to love my neighbor; not kill or steal; and not commit adultery. On top of what God commanded, Jesus raised the bar; Jesus said, "But I tell you that anyone who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart" (Matthew 5:28, NIV).

Jesus knew that God's fallen creation could never fill the righteous demands of the law. Jesus came to do what God's creation could not do, fill the law's righteous demands. For all who believe in Christ—Christians, God is counting the law's righteous demands met in Christ. "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:17-19, NIV). Knowing what God has done for me, what I could not do for myself, is really good news. I am thankful that Christ has met the law's righteous demands for me; and should I miss the mark, and I will, when I ask His forgiveness, it's as if I never missed the mark at all. Christ has met the law's righteous demands for all time, space, and eternity—praise be to God.

So, the next time you're feeling hypocritical, remind yourself that Christ has fulfilled the law's righteous demands for you. Ask God's forgiveness, and enjoy His ministry of reconciliation. Remember, being a Christ follower does not make one perfect, but it does make one perfectly forgiven.

The following was written in January by Dale Graves, Interim Director of Belize Friends Mission and taken from the The ADVOCATE, United Society of Friends Women International.

### **GUILFORD COLLEGE VISIT:**

Some while ago I received an email from Frank Massey wondering if it would be possible for a group of Guilford College (North Carolina) students to visit Belize. After making contact with Eden in the Friends United Meeting office, we proceeded with plans. The first plan was for the group to be in Belize for 7 days, then fly to Jamaica and be there for 7 days.

We discovered that there is no flight from Belize to Jamaica. Belizeans who want to visit Jamaica fly to Miami, stay overnight, and fly on to Jamaica. Well, that was going to raise the cost of the trip significantly, so we made arrangements for the group to spend the whole 14 days in Belize.

We cast about for ways to be helpful for that period of time. I asked if the group would be willing to do some original research on Quakers in Belize. The Cains, the Barbers, the Stouts, and Judy Lumb still live here; and I thought we could set up some interviews with them as well as with Ms Candi. Frank asked the students and indicated that they were excited about that possibility. The plan also included tutoring in the classroom from the beginning of the school day until the mid-morning snack break and some hands on projects at the school, including giving the exterior paint a good scrubbing.

We scheduled the Barber home for their lodging; but with the addition of the second week, we had to move, in the middle of their stay, to the Belcove hotel, which is downtown next to the river. There were actually some advantages to being downtown, because it was an easy walk to eating places and to school.

We scheduled a little playtime as well, of course, and a trip to Caye Caulker was on the agenda from the start. Then we discovered that the aunt and uncle of one of the Guilford students, Christopher, lived on Ambergris Caye near San Pedro. So some students visited there as well. The students also went on a field trip we already had scheduled for our students to the water treatment plant and to the Museum of Belize.

When it came close to the end of the trip, we began to realize that our students and the Guilford students had formed some friendships; and so a little party on the last day at school was in order, cupcakes and all. On Tuesday before departure on Wednesday, we drove to the St Hermann's Cave/Blue Hole National Park which is staffed by the Audubon Society.

Ms Candi and I took them to the airport on Wednesday and made sure they got through the airport. It must have been a bit of shock to leave Belize City at about 80 degrees and arrive to snow and freezing rain in North Carolina.

I have traveled with college groups. I have heard other hosts talk about the horrors of hosting college groups – and I really must say that they don't come any better than this one. They were respectful of our staff and of our students. They were loving and caring. They were full participants in Sunday morning worship and they always conducted themselves in ways that made me proud. I will probably be spoiled for time immemorial.

## SHAVING CREAM EARTH


God created this wonderful world and told us to care for it. Remember that by making a unique painting.

## What you need:

- A cookie sheer

#### What you do:

- 3. Place the bottom of the paper plate on top of the paint. Press it down gently so the whole plate bottom is covered in paint.
- 4. Lift up the plate and gently remove excess shaving cream with the stick.
- 5. After the painting dries, hang it on your wall.
